Note: DMC Field Trips are for club members of DMC-affiliated clubs and their families only. Liability issues mean that these trips cannot be attended by the general public unless otherwise noted.

Vulcan Limestone Mine

TRIP: Echinoids (fossil sand dollars and urchins), druzy calcite crystals, and chert for cabbing. There are shark teeth but seldom found.

BRING: This is surface hunting, so digging tools are not necessary, other than a screw driver or butter knife to pry fossils from dirt. A rock hammer is helpful at times if you want a piece of chert. We park at the hunting site, so you can leave your lunch, drinks and cooler in the car. Sun screen might be handy. Bring drinks and snacks as we stay until 12:00 noon and/or 2:00 PM.

REQUIREMENTS: Sturdy closed shoes or sneakers, no sandals or open toed shoes. Jeans or long pants are preferred to protect your knees and long sleeve shirt or sun screen. If it is a bright day, a hat or ball cap would be useful.

CHILDREN: Yes.

PETS: No.

FACILITIES: The one thing they do not have is a restroom, stop at the gas station in Brooksville before you arrive.



Reviewing: Bornite

A copper iron sulfide mineral often called "peacock ore" because of its tarnish.

What is Bornite?

Bornite is a copper iron sulfide mineral with a chemical composition of Cu_5FeS_4 . It occurs in igneous, metamorphic, and sedimentary rocks. Mined concentrations of bornite occur in hydrothermal veins, contact metamorphic zones, and in the enriched zone of many sulfide mineral deposits. Chalcopyrite, marcasite, and pyrite are other sulfide minerals commonly associated with bornite. Small amounts of bornite are also found disseminated through mafic igneous rocks and carbonaceous shales.

"Peacock Ore"

Bornite is easily recognized because it tarnishes to iridescent shades of blue, purple, red, green and yellow. It is commonly called "peacock ore" or "purple copper ore" after these iridescent colors. Upon surface exposure, bornite will weather to chalcocite or other copper minerals.

Bornite is a popular and fast-selling mineral specimen at museums, mineral shows, and tourist shops. However, some material sold as "peacock ore" has a tarnish with spectacular colors - greatly exceeding what is expected on bornite. This material is frequently chalcopyrite that has been intentionally tarnished with acid. This treatment is done to produce an item that is visually appealing and sells rapidly.

Physical Properties of Bornite

The colorful iridescent tarnish of bornite and its low hardness are very helpful for separating bornite from other minerals with a submetallic to metallic luster. Few of them have a similar tarnish, and most of them are much harder.

Physical Properties of Bornite

Chemical Classification	Sulfide
Color	Reddish brown or brownish red on a fresh surface. Iridescent purple, blue, and black on a tarnished surface.
Streak	Grayish black
Luster	Submetallic to metallic
Diaphaneity	Opaque
Cleavage	Poor
Mohs Hardness	3
Specific Gravity	5.0 to 5.1
Diagnostic Properties	Color, tarnish, lower hardness than similar minerals. Almost always found in massive occurrences and very rarely as tiny crystals.
Chemical Composition	Copper iron sulfide, Cu_5FeS_4
Crystal System	Orthorhombic
Uses	Primarily an ore of copper.
